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Computer Vision Syndrome Affects Millions Article Submitted by MaryLei Barclay

New York Times by Jane Brody (Released 5/30/2016) - Joanne Reitano is a professor of history at LaGuardia Community College in Long Island City, Queens. She writes wonderful books about the history of the city and state, and has recently been spending many hours—sometimes all day—at her computer to revise her first book. “The Restless City.” But while sitting in front of the screen, she told me, “I developed burning in my eyes that made it very difficult to work.”

After resting her eyes for a while, the discomfort abates, but it quickly returns when she goes back to the computer. “If I was playing computer games, I’d turn off the computer, but I need it to work,” the

frustrated professor said.

Dr. Reitano has a condition called computer vision syndrome. She is hardly alone. It can affect anyone who spends three or more hours a day in front of computer monitors, and the population at risk is potentially huge.

Worldwide, up to 70 million workers are at risk for computer vision syndrome, and those numbers are only likely to grow. In a [report](#) about the condition written by eye care specialists in Nigeria and Botswana and published in *Medical Practice and Reviews*, the authors detail an expanding list of professionals at risk—accountants, architects, bankers, engineers, flight controllers, graphic artists, journalists, academi-

cians, secretaries, and students—all of whom “cannot work without the help of a computer.”

And that’s not counting the millions of children and adolescents who spend many hours of a day playing computer games.

Studies have indicated 70% to 90% of people who use computers extensively, whether for work or play, have on or more symptoms of computer vision syndrome. The effects of prolonged computer use are not just vision-related. Complaints include neurological symptoms like chronic headaches and musculoskeletal problems like neck and back pain. Still, the most common computer-related complaint involves the eyes, which can develop... [Article](#)

Mental Floss Magazine—*January 2015 Issue* **Lost & Found on Trains over the years:**

British composer Havergail Brian spent a whole year writing his first violin concerto. He finished the draft in June 1934, stuffed it in a briefcase, and promptly lost the bag containing it at London's Victoria station. Starting from scratch, Brian took another

whole year to finish his Violin Concerto No. 2.

Each worth millions, about 600 Stradivarius violins still exist. In 2012, a musician lent his rare instrument to a friend so he could play it at a birthday party. But the real surprise came when his buddy accidentally left it on a train in Bern, Switzerland. Thankfully, a good Samaritan turned it in.

In 1922, Hemingway's wife Hadley was planning to visit her husband in

Switzerland. So she packed up all of his papers in a suitcase and boarded a train in Paris. But while the locomotive sat at a station, Hadley decided to grab a bottle of Evian water and left the suitcase on the train. When she returned the suitcase was gone. It had contained all of Hemingway's early fiction. Then unpublished as a novelist. Papa griped to Ezra Pound, "All that remains of my complete works are the three pencil crafts of a bum poem..."



The Jumping Beans

Grades 3-4

Summary

This is a classic sequential movement puzzle, very cleverly designed. The solution involves an orderly weaving pattern, you must study carefully and move very deliberately all the way through the puzzle.

Equipment Needed

- Puzzle Play Mat
- Three coins or game tokens for one side of the board
- Three coins or game tokens (different) for the other side of the board
- A sign that explains how to play and that shows start and finish positions. Take care to show, with drawings and explanations, what moves are legal and what moves are not legal. . . this is very important.

Set down the Puzzle Play Mat and place the puzzle tokens into Start Position as shown in the illustration
