



Now Arriving on the New York Subway: Free E-Books, Timed for Your Commute—*New York Times* by James Barron (Released 8/28/2016) - On Sunday, Subway Reads started delivering novellas, short stories or excerpts from full-length books to passengers' cellphones or tablets. The idea is for riders to download a short story or a chapter and read it on the train. [Article](#)

Why Milwaukee's Online Newspaper Archive Vanished Overnight—*Slate* by Henry Gabar (Released 8/24/2016) - Michail Tachach had bookmarked hundreds of articles and images from the archives of Milwaukee's two big newspapers, the *Milwaukee Journal* and the *Milwaukee Sentinel*. The New York Public Library is Moving 1.5 Million Books to an Underground Lair—*Atlas Obscura* by Sarah Laskow (Released 8/17/2016) - This summer, several times a week, a 30-foot truck filled with rough wooden shelves of books has arrived early in the morning at the New York Public Library's flagship research library. Each truckload contains thousands of books, which have been sitting for the past three years at a storage facility upstate. Now, 1.5 million books are migrating



home, although not to the shelves they once occupied, in the library's old stacks beneath the Rose Main Reading Room. From the loading dock, the shelves are moved through the maze below the library, until they are two levels below the ground. [Article](#)

The Italian government is giving teens €550 on their 18th birthday to spend on books—*The Independent* by Christopher Hooton (Released 8/23/2016) - In a move designed to remind young people that culture can enrich one's life and bring people together, Italian citizens are to get a €500 'culture bonus' on their 18th birthday. The initiative launches on 15 September, and bonus can be spent on books, concert tickets, theatre tickets, cinema tickets, museum visits and trips to national parks. [Article](#)

Denmark's futuristic "citizen space" has been named the world's best public library—*Quartz* by Anne Quito (Released 8/18/2016) - The library, as we know it, is obsolete. Now that most books are accessible online, the building once dedicated to silence and study is increasingly turning into a lively public gathering place—when it's not disappearing altogether. There's hope for this new era in libraries, encapsulated in Denmark's vast Dokki1, a mixed-used "citizen space" with meeting rooms, art installations, classrooms, performance stages, makers' workshops, and playgrounds, in addition to the usual rows of bookshelves. Real pigs visit Rapid City Public Library for Charlotte's Web screening—*KOTA TV* by Melea VanOstrand (Released 8/14/2016) - Sunday afternoon families were able to check out "some pig" at the Rapid City Public Library. Walter and Wilbur the pigs of Maude Hog & Cattle made a visit to the library to take photos with families for the library's Charlotte's Web screening. The event featured the 2006 film version of E.B. White's Charlotte's Web featuring the voices of Julia Roberts, Oprah Winfrey, Robert Redford and

"We are trying to be proactive in bringing the best quality staff to the library," board President Carol Peck told the Teton county board of County Commissioners recently. 

In 1895 the Sullivan brothers opened their first opal mine in Australia. By 1915 they had six mines in different locations. Can you match each map location (A-F), with the name of the mine, the year it was opened and weight of the largest opal discovered at each mine?

Years opened: 1895, 1899, 1903, 1908, 1910, 1915
 Opal weights: 352gms, 395gms, 428gms, 480gms, 515gms, 552gms

1. The opal weighing 552gms was discovered at either location D or Tullaroo (which was opened either four years before or four years after the mine at location B).
2. The opal found in 1908 weighed more than the one mined at Marraville (which isn't location A) and less than the mine at location F (which was opened five years before the mine at location E).
3. Larradoo mine is located due north of the one opened in 1895.
4. The gem weighing 480gms wasn't discovered at Warrengo (which is located due south of the mine opened in 1910 where the opal weighing 428gms was found).
5. The opal weighing 395gms was found at Karoomba which is located somewhere east of at least one of the other mines.
6. Barrabilly isn't the most westerly mine and was opened four years later than the mine at location C.
